Veterans Day



Tomorrow is the 101st anniversary of the armistice which ended the hostilities of the Great War. World War I officially ended on June 28, 1919 with the Treaty of Versailles. It can be argued that the Versailles treaty set the stage for the second chapter of the Great War that is commonly called World War II. The map of the world changed considerably after the armi-

stice and still reflects those changes today. The Ottoman Empire was dismembered into the many countries of the Middle East. With the fall of Czarist Russia during the last year of the Great War, the rise of the Soviet Union precipitated the expansion of Communism. The subsequent wars and conflicts that marked the remainder of the twentieth century are directly contingent upon the armistice of 1918. The world powers were exhausted by the blood and treasure expended. Despite the military victories of the European powers, the colonial empires of Great Britain and France would never recover. At the conclusion of the Great War, the United States expanded American influence around the world to inevitably become a superpower after 1945. The experience of the twentieth century was marked by nearly continuous warfare. During times of conflict and the brief periods of peace, the cost of our bellicose desire has been worn on the faces of our veterans. It is suitable and right that on Veterans Day we honor those who have served our nation honorably and discharged their duty well. It was President Eisenhower who issued the first Veterans Day Proclamation to honor the American veterans of all wars on the observance of Armistice Day. It is the day we honor those who have served our nation and are yet among us in witness to their service. Memorial Day is particularly reserved for those who have died for their country and for those veterans who are no longer living. Armed Forces Day

on May 16th is designated to honor those who are currently serving in our military.

As a child of a war veteran, I grew up in the "boomer" generation. The mobilization of the nation for the war effort substantially transformed the character of America. My father never spoke of his experience during the war. Like so many other veterans he was grateful to have survived and only wished to pursue the life he must have envisioned during his deployment. No one despises war more than the veteran who has experienced the horror of it. My father saw his participation as a duty that needed to be performed. As a patriot he did what he had to do, but neither was he proud of what had to be done. It was a chapter in his life that was over and he would spend the remainder of his time contributing to the restoration of what was lost. He was saddened by the subsequent wars in Korea and Vietnam, but never lost his patriotic sensibility for the American way of life. He always understood his duty and had the strength of character to hold the conflicting reality of war and desire for peace in a tenuous balance.

The conflicts of the past have continued into the present. Our new century began with another attack more devastating than Pearl Harbor. As the current war sporadically expands like brushfires on the land, the burden is visible on the faces of the veterans. The damaged lives of our veterans carry the story of those who pay the price for war. There is no glory in their demeanor, but they deserve our admiration and respect for their commitment and obedience to their patriotic duty. The liberty we so often take for granted is continually defended and preserved by those who are willing to pay the price. We are humbled by their sacrifice and grateful for their service. May our merciful God grant the blessings of peace on all our veterans.

Friendships of Virtue By Fr. William Summerlin Parochial Vicar

Friendship is one of God's greatest gifts to humanity. Ultimately, our most important friendship should be our friendship with God. As Jesus Himself said, "No longer do I call you slaves...I have called you friends" (John 15:15). God also wants us to have friendships with other human beings. Jesus Himself had many friends while He was on this earth. He was friends with His Twelve Apostles, as well as with Martha, Mary, and Lazarus. Interestingly, research shows that having friends greatly increases one's quality of life. First of all, having friendships in one's life has many psychological benefits, including: higher levels of happiness, lower levels of stress and depression, an increase in one's sense of belonging and purpose, a better ability to cope with trauma, and encouragement to change or avoid unhealthy habits. Having good friends can even reduce the risk of health problems, such as: diabetes, heart disease, high blood pressure, and obesity. This reveals how important it is to have friends!

However, not all friendships are the same. Aristotle, the famous Greek philosopher who lived from 384-322 BC, taught that there are three types of friendships: (1) friendships of utility, (2) friendships of pleasure, and (3) friendships of virtue. In friendships of utility, what brings people together is that they find each other useful. For example, business partner relationships and partners for school projects can be seen as friendships of utility. Friendships of pleasure consist of people who have a good time together. The sole basis for these friendships is shared hobbies/activities/interests. Aristotle does not condemn these two types of friendships. They are not bad, in and of themselves. However, they usually lack depth and are short-lived. When the mutual usefulness or the shared hobby go away, so does the friendship.

The third type of friendship that Aristotle describes is a friendship of virtue. A friendship of virtue involves a relationship of true love — when the friends desire the good of each other. In this type of friendship, people will help each other grow in holiness and virtue, and will even challenge each other and sacrifice for each other when necessary. Ultimately, a friendship of virtue has God at the center of the relationship. While the other two types of friends are not bad, a friendship of virtue is what we want to seek out. When we have these types of friendships, it can be life-changing!







Understanding Liturgy The Dedication of the Lateran Basilica—Feast (Nov. 9)

St. John Lateran is one of the four major basilicas in Rome, with St. Peter, St. Mary Major and St. Paul Outside the Walls. It is unique among the four because it (not St. Peter's) is the cathedral church of the Bishop of Rome. "Lateran" was the name of a Roman family whose land was seized for the Church by the Emperor Constantine. It later became the site of a great basilica dedicated to honor John the Baptist. For many centuries, the old Lateran palace was the residence of popes. It was only after the 14th century that the popes actually started to live at the Vatican.

The basilica now has a triple dedication in honor of St. John the Baptist, St. John the Evangelist and our Lord. It is very interesting to note that in front of the basilica there is an inscription in Latin that says "This is the mother and head of all churches in the whole world." This reminds us why we celebrate this dedication throughout the universal Church. We truly are one family, and are led by one shepherd, who is the successor of St. Peter.

When the feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica falls on a Sunday, the readings and prayers for the feast replace those of the Sunday celebration. There is a special preface for the Eucharistic Prayer provided for the day; it's entitled "The mystery of the Church, the Bride of Christ and the Temple of the Spirit." Throughout the entire prayer we hear the theology of the Feast. The prayer speaks to reminding all that every church is a house of prayer. The sacred liturgies that are celebrated in every single Church are first a celebration of the Mystery of God. It is during the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, and through all the sacraments and liturgical rites of the Church that we encounter the Holy Trinity-God the Father, The Son and the Holy Spirit. "For in your benevolence you are pleased to dwell in this house of prayer in order to perfect us as the temple of the Holy Spirit, supported by the perpetual help of your grace and resplendent with the glory of a life acceptable to you. Year by year you sanctify the Church, the Bride of Christ, foreshadowed in visible buildings, so that, rejoicing as the mother of countless children, she may be given her place in your heavenly glory" (Roman Missal, Preface).

For this feast, the priest wears a white chasuble and a solemn blessing is provided. Although we mark the dedication of a building we more importantly give thanks for the Church itself, God's "chosen" and "faithful" people, who will "build up the heavenly Jerusalem" (Roman Missal, Collect, first option). We are reminded when we celebrate the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica that we should seek the unity of Christ's body, symbolized in so many church buildings but made present in living assemblies.

This feast of the dedication of the Lateran Basilica is a feast that celebrates unity and the diversity of the whole people of God - the young and old, men and women, the ordained and the lay, the rich and the poor, black and white, urban, suburban and rural, Latino and all other cultures, into one people of God. We are all family. We celebrate both our diversity, our uniqueness; and we celebrate that we are family, a people of God united in Christ Jesus with God as the Father of us all. We come to celebrate in a sacred, holy building, yet the church is not the building, it's the holy people of God, the true living stones, coming together to encounter the Mystery of God and also to be transformed by this encounter. We are reminded of this in the Prayer after Communion "O God, who chose to foreshadow for us the heavenly Jerusalem through the sign of your Church on earth, grant, we pray, that, by partaking of this Sacrament, we may be made the temple of your grace and may enter the dwelling place of your glory. Through Christ our **Lord**. Amen" (Roman Missal, Prayer After Communion). The holiness of this building, the sacredness of our rites, the beauty of the liturgy, are really just a foretaste of the glory of eternal life.

What's Happening at our Sister Parish, St. Genevieve?

The year 2019 has not been a good one for Haiti. Civil unrest and continuing joblessness has prevented Haitians from escaping the pitfalls of poverty. There will not be any planned mission trips until it is deemed safe by the officials there for us to travel to Haiti. The Seton Haiti Committee remains committed in providing funds for our sister parish in Duval, Haiti. For all your generous donations, there is always the attempt by the participants at being good stewards of your treasures. We are further encouraged by a recent letter from St. Genevieve's pastor, Fr. Raphael. He wrote, "Thank you for what you are for the parish of St. Genevieve, materially and spiritually: the church, the school, the school canteen and the dispensary. I can hardly imagine how the parish works without your support. While thanking you for your very valuable collaboration, I beg you to count on our fervent prayers."


The school canteen that Father mentioned is the newly established four-day/week lunch program. The teachers were discouraged at being unable to properly teach hungry children, and so this program became a necessary component to successful teaching efforts. He also refers to a dispensary, which is the clinic next to the church. It provides the parishioners the availability of a full-time registered nurse. We also pay the fees of a Haitian physician, (Dr. Samuel) to visit the clinic once a month to see the sicker patients of the parish.

In order to remain a successful and viable committee, we ask if you would consider extending your time and talent, as well. We welcome younger and older parishioners alike, and we meet every third Tuesday of the month in the Wake Chapel at 7:15 pm. Hope to see you there for the next meeting, November 19th!

How to Make a Report: Indiana law requires that any individual who has reason to believe that a child is a victim of abuse or neglect must report immediately to: The local Child Protection Services agency (Hotline: 800-800-5556); or A local law enforcement agency. Under Indiana law, it is a criminal act not to make such a report. This law applies to all adults without exception.


